Subject: Concerns raised regarding RPD interactions with ICE



Dear Bill,

*Please pass this information on to Mr. Soto and any others you deem appropriate:*

The Richmond Police Department .is very sensitive to the importance of building and maintaining credibility and trust with all community residents, regardless of their immigration status, ethnicity, or race. We are aware that certain recent ICE (Immigration & Customs Enforcement) activities in and around Richmond have had a detrimental impact on the positive relationships we are trying to build with members of the Latino community and we are not involved in these activities.

RPD does have a very limited, but necessary, working relationship with Immigration & Customs Enforcement. This relationship has been, and will continue to be, consistent with the guidelines established through Richmond city ordinance.

The department does not work with ICE on immigration/deportation matters, such as accompanying or assisting ICE with the apprehension of individuals who are illegally in this country. The ICE Fugitive Team, which recently made a number of arrests and apprehensions in the East Bay (including within the city of Richmond), does not tell us about their activities, nor do we assist them with these types of "sweeps."

ICE does has a task force which focuses specifically on the activities of MS-13, an extremely dangerous and violent gang that poses a serious public safety threat to our community and to residents of many other cities around the country. MS-13 is very active in El Salvador, but over the past decade, their activities have reached into the U.S. and Mexico, resulting in many deaths and the creation of a major organized crime network that involves illegal drugs, illegal real estate and financial dealings, and the shakedowns of legitimate (often minority-run) businesses.

I have authorized certain officers from our Investigations Division to work with ICE's MS-13 Gang Task Force on MS-13 gang related issues and individuals ONLY. This authorization was given back in early summer. Choosing not to work with this task force would deprive our department of significant intelligence and technical resources that are critical for dealing with illegal gang activities in Richmond. Our limited work with this task force has not involved rounding up individuals for immigration violations or other immigration-related activities.

ICE also provided us with Customs-related assistance in the apprehension of a Richmond homicide suspect last Spring who was caught near the Washington-Canadian border. I am entirely comfortable with this cooperation, as it allowed us to arrest a wanted, dangerous individual who is now facing homicide charges.

That's the extent of our interactions with ICE that I have authorized or otherwise sanctioned. RMC ordinance 29-90 does not require the City Manager or I provide these authorizations in writing, but I am always happy to provide information about what we're doing as long as it doesn't compromise active law enforcement investigations. If there are further issues or concerns I should know about, I would be happy to do the appropriate follow-up and look into any issues raised.

### **Richmond City Resolution - RESOLUTION NO. XX.07**

#### **A RESOLUTION OF THE RICHMOND CITY COUNCIL REAFFIRMING ITS SUPPORT FOR COMPREHENSIVE IMMIGRATION REFORM THAT IS FAIR, JUST AND HUMANE**

WHEREAS, The City of Richmond welcomes and values all of its residents and supports them to live and work free from discrimination, hostility, abuse, violence, exploitation and fear of local, state and federal law enforcement; and

WHEREAS, one fourth of the residents of Richmond are persons who were born in foreign countries and who have come to the U.S. in search of better lives for themselves and their families; and

WHEREAS; National experts and policy makers agree our federal immigration policy is broken, inconsistent and in need of reform; and

WHEREAS; Most economists agree that immigrants and undocumented workers are good for the US economy and studies show that immigrants contribute \$25-30 billion more in taxes than they receive in services; and

WHEREAS; A crackdown on illegal immigration in 2004 caused a shortage of workers needed to bring in the agricultural crop in the Western United States which caused a \$1 billion dollar loss for the industry; and

WHEREAS, The City of Richmond in resolution 35-06 of April 18, 2006 called for a comprehensive immigration reform bill that is fair, just and humane; that recognizes all immigrants for their contributions to our economic and social life; and

WHEREAS The City of Richmond passed Ordinance 29-90 to affirms its desire to foster an atmosphere of trust and cooperation between the Richmond Police Department and all residents of the city of Richmond; and

WHEREAS, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) has acknowledged through press reports that its officers identify themselves as “police”, which technically correct misleads the residents of Richmond, by suggesting they are Richmond Police Department officers investigating local crimes and undermines the trust built by the Richmond Police Department; and

WHEREAS, the community and church leaders have received also numerous complaints of people arrested at places of work and in public places, for which no warrants existed, creating a climate of fear among immigrant families; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the US Department of Homeland Security and the US Immigration and Customs Enforcement be called upon to issue a moratorium on raids until the US Congress comes to an agreement on comprehensive immigration reform so that the debate can be carried out in good faith, rather than against a backdrop of fear, repression and intimidation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Richmond reaffirms the terms of ordinance No. 20-90 ordering all officers and employees of this City not to inform, assist or cooperate with the Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) formerly known as Immigration and Naturalization Service, without the specific authorization of the Richmond City Manager or the Chief of Police; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Richmond calls for the Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) officers conducting any future official business in Richmond to clearly and specifically identify themselves as federal immigration officers and to proactively and clearly state that they are not officers of the Richmond Police Department; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Richmond reaffirms its support for comprehensive immigration reform bill that is fair, just and humane; that recognizes all immigrants for their contributions to our economic and social life; that provides a system that addresses the backlog of visas to reunite families currently separated; that provides undocumented workers and students with a path toward permanent residency; and prevents the criminalization of the estimated 12 million undocumented immigrants currently residing in the United States; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Richmond City Council directs the Clerk of the Richmond City Council to send copies of this resolution to Michael Chertoff, Secretary for Homeland Security, and to Federal representatives including Senator Dianne Feinstein, Senator Barbara Boxer, and Congressman George Miller.

Carolyn and others,

I wanted to call to your attention that yesterday the immigration department made a sweep very close to [the writer preferred to not include the name of the school for the purposes of this guide] in the morning as families and students were arriving to school. I don't know for sure how many of our families were taken by immigration, we are trying to determine this.

Several families kept their children at home when they saw the immigration vehicles. The biggest impact was that several students, including those that are documented, were traumatized by this experience. We had several students asking what would happen to them if their parents were taken away, one Anglo student was "freaking out" according to her father, and there is a report of at least one student waited in the office long after school ended because it was suspected that her parents were taken by immigration.

I am so angry along with staff members and parents. We feel that this action can not go without something being said or done. My anger has to do with the immigration's decision to make a "sweep" near an elementary school at a time when parents were bringing their children to school. Needless to state many of our parents and students observed this action and are upset and in the case of our students many have been traumatized.

I am hoping that there will be some coordinated community action condemning the immigration department's procedure near an elementary school during a peak hour for families, i.e. letters to the governor, mayor, senators and congress representatives, press conference, etc.

Where does the community stand on this issue?
